In March 2019, the government passed the Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019 (CSPA), as part of the Comprehensive Ontario Police Services Act, 2019. Once in force, the CSPA will replace the current Police Services Act (PSA). The CSPA is an opportunity to modernize policing and enhance community safety in Ontario.

As part of the work to bring the Act into force, the Ministry of the Solicitor General (SolGen) is working on regulations on a number of matters.

**[Adequate and Effective Policing \(General\) Regulation under the Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019](#)**

SolGen is seeking to modernize the regulatory framework for adequate and effective policing to provide greater quality and consistency in the delivery of police services across Ontario. The proposed general regulation sets out standards and procedures for the policing functions that are a part of adequate and effective policing under Crime Prevention; Law Enforcement; Maintaining the Public Peace; Emergency Response; Assistance to Victims of Crime; and any other prescribed policing functions. Other regulations deal with other specific requirements of adequate and effective policing.

**[Response to Active Attacker Incidents \(Adequacy Standard\) under the Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019](#)**

The Ministry of the Solicitor General (SolGen) is proposing to regulate police response to active attacker incidents to standardize practices across the province and facilitate coordination in multi-jurisdictional events.

**[Major Incident Response Plan](#)**

SolGen is seeking to replace the current Provincial Counter Terrorism Plan (PCTP) with a Major Incident Response Plan, which is intended to be broader in scope in that it would not solely be limited to acts of terrorism.
