



As both Mayor Howarth, Councillor Nann are fully aware of the community challenges with the saturation of social services in our area and all the stressor that were already present in Stinson.


In an unprecedented decision made by those at City Hall (with absolutely NO community consultation) a decision was made to increase the beds in our community by 123.


I am writing this email prior to the police budget meeting.

To Whom It May Concern,

I am a concerned citizen and business owner in Hamilton.

In the four years we have been operating our business in Hamilton, we have seen a steady increase in crime and general lawlessness in our immediate community, and many communities around us.

In many of our phone calls and emails to the Hamilton Police services, we came to learn, that the community patrol officer numbers was increased from TWO officers to six... This is simply not even close to enough, to cover so many crime-ridden areas.

I have read in the news that although shootings have increased, the number of homicides have decreased... but should we really be thankful that the criminals who obtain guns have bad aim? Or, should we look more towards getting guns off the streets, and criminals incarcerated?

On a daily basis, we are seeing a multitude of problems uncovered at Hamilton's "encampments"... from arson to organized rising drug enterprises, and even murders.

We need safer communities, and it isn't happening with the current City Council ... I, and many of my community advocates and peers - feel that the police services is our only hope.

We need safe communities, which will not happen without more proactive policing and strategic community placed officers.

Give them what they need to make the communities safer. When communities are safer, they become thriving, desirable places for people to work and live. The Hamilton Police Services are asking for a 5.7% increase, which I truly believe is a modest increase - considering the increase in crime, increase in the city population size and geographical boundary.

To the Hamilton Police Services Board,

The Hamilton Centre for Civic Inclusion is concerned about the proposed increase to the Hamilton Police Services Budget proposed for 2025 and encourage the Board to vote against this increase. We are concerned for the following reasons:

- 1) The Hamilton Police Services consistently asks for budget increases each year in amounts that exceed the increases afforded other services in the city. Underfunded services that support housing, mental health, supports for survivors of sexual violence, addressing discrimination and racism, and increasing food security are more important areas of investment for our city to build truly inclusive and safe communities.
- 2) We have not seen adequate and meaningful reports-back from HPS that any of the previous budget increases have resulted in better outcomes for the community. Policing solutions to social crises have been and continue to be proposed, but they also continue to be shown to be ineffective in actually addressing community needs and, importantly, exacerbate harms and violence to those already most marginalized in our communities.
- 3) There has been an inadequate and dismissive approach to community feedback on this and previous budget increase requests. The HPS Budget Committee initially provided a deadline for public comment on a 5.7% increase without releasing any budget details. Subsequently, the Board extended the deadline for public comment until more details had been released. However, those details have shown that the budget increase that HPS is asking for is not actually 5.7% but over 10% if you include the proposed use of reserve funds and the HPS is claiming they need at least 8.32% increase to maintain status quo. This lack of transparency and clarity in what is actually being proposed for public comment makes it impossible to hold the HPS Budget Committee accountable in a meaningful way as community.
- The proposed budget includes staffing and other cost increases related to Race-Based Data collection and Intimate Partner Violence; however, there needs to be greater clarity to community about why these pieces of work require additional funding that are not already part of HPS work. For examples, the budget document says HPS needs to develop an IPV Unit "To bring awareness to the rising issue, assist victims and offer support to those in abusive relationships". For the Hamilton

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community this raises the question of a) why this work has not already been integrated into HPS current operations, considering the well-known scope of IPV and the years-long campaigns around this issues and b) whether city funding might more effectively address this issue by supporting community services that support survivors in trauma-informed and survivor-centric ways.

We hope that you will take these considerations seriously during your deliberations on the proposed budget increase.

Every since they opened the needle exchange (The Hub) it's been hell living on this Street. I have lived here since 1997, I'm 65 years old and have had to put up with open drug use violence, thefts, damage to property. I have gone weeks not getting a full night's sleep because had to watch the property or woke up because of fighting screaming all hours of the night. I have complained to everyone I was told to contact and it was only the Police who were able to settle things down. The homeless took over this Street for 4 years and when we see the police it's such a sense of relief. I don't think most people realize what it's like when you have homeless drug addicts living across the street from your front door. Most people see them when they drive by as they are going to work or driving back home to their safe neighborhood. Try being here 24/7. I feel the police deserve whatever is necessary to keep protecting us and making our community a safe place for all.
